Background	Some recommended workshop discussion topics are: 1. Is the Council supportive of the vision and mission statements contained on Pages 2 and 7? 2. Do the goals outlined in Chapter 3 reflect the direction Nibley City should be headed? 3. Do the projects outlined in Chapter 4 do enough to accomplish the goals of Chapter 3? The town center appendix is not an ordinance. It is a document outlining a series of concepts for the Council, staff and residents to read and review and become familiar with the idea of a town center and its possibilities. One of the projects discussed in Chapter 4 is the creation of town center overlay ordinance, which staff is in the earliest stages of preparing. The document will reflect many of the ideas and concepts presented in the ordinance. Because it is going to be a major component of any future land use and residential development discussion, staff is hopeful that the workshop will also include an informed discussion on multi-family housing possibilities in Nibley. Recognizing that all housing development is market-driven, a discussion of opening the City up to housing densities other than traditional single-family would be appropriate so the City can prepare ordinances that will bring the highest quality residential development into Nibley, when the market dictates that housing be built.

Background	Utah Code 10-9a-401 requires that: "each municipality shall prepare and adopt a comprehensive, long-range general plan for the present and future needs of the municipality and growth and development of all or any part of the land within the municipality." Nibley City's General Plan was last updated in December 2007. In late 2015, Nibley City contracted with Logan Simpson Design ("LSD"), a	
	Salt Lake based land use consulting firm, to prepare an update to the Nibley City General Plan.	
	Over the past several months, LSD has conducted a number of public open houses and information gathering sessions, reviewed and analyzed current and past City master plans, and has spent many hours in meetings with various public bodies and also with staff.	
	The General Plan, as presented, is broken down into four sections: 1- Our Vision 2- Our Foundation 3- Our Framework 4- Our Commitment	
	The first two sections, Our Vision and Our Foundation, discuss the history of the City and provide valuable demographic information and trends which lay the foundation for the final two sections. Our Framework outlines the goals and policies that the City will use to guide how we develop policies, projects and ordinances for the next 7-10 years. Our Commitment outlines the projects that the City will undertake to accomplish those goals and policies.	
	Based on the recommendations in the General Plan, as it stands, having been reviewed and favorably recommended to Council by the Planning Commission, staff has begun to work on a number of ordinances and maps that will implement those goals.	
	Specifically, staff is working on the land use map and an updated annexation policy and map and the Planning Commission reviewed those at their meeting last week.	

	One concern that was raised at the public hearing at the last City Council meeting was the lack of specific references to rural character. While there is significant discussion about open space and preserving natural corridors, and while several of the vision statements imply a need to preserve rural character, LSD has stated that there are several places where it could be more explicitly stated that those goals are in pursuit of a desire to maintain rural character. Krissy from LSD will be at this meeting to address any questions and comments that the Council has.
Recommendation	Provide direction to staff and consultant on any desired changes and/or approve the ordinance when ready
Financial Impact	There is no direct financial impact in the adoption of the General Plan. There will be an undetermined financial impact in implementing the components of the plan. The cost to update the plan and associated downtown plan was \$35,000.

Background	The first draft of the budget for the next fiscal year was presented to the City Council and public at the May 5 Council meeting. Staff reviewed various changes in the budget and department heads made presentation about accomplishments and plans for the coming year. Resolution 16:06 would adopt the budget for the next fiscal year, as well as make any final adjustments to the current year budget. Approval of this resolution would increase the stormwater fee from \$6.50 to \$6.75 per month per residence and would propose the property tax rate as 0.001667. If Cache County certifies a tax rate lower than this rate, this rate will not become the final adopted rate until after the City holds a truth in taxation hearing on August 4. Some of the changes made to the budget document since its first draft presentation include the following: • Addition of a new sales tax graphic • Addition of information about debts owed and payoff schedules • Addition of prioritized capital project lists to several departments		
	 Minor corrections and additions of missing account descriptions Minor formatting or cosmetic changes 		
	Additional minor changes are expected before final adoption in June.		
Recommendation	Receive public input and provide staff with direction on any proposed changes and make a motion to advance the resolution to the second reading.		
Financial Impact	The total City budget for the next fiscal year is proposed to be \$6.7 million dollars. This is a decrease from \$7.5 million in the current		

	budget year. The majority of that decrease is due to the well project, which increased the budget significantly in the current budget year, however the budget also proposes to decrease the budgets of most general fund departments.

Background	In 2003, Nibley City became what is known as a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Phase 2 community. What this means is that in order for the City to discharge storm water runoff from streets and hard surfaces to any natural water body, the City must obtain a permit from the State of Utah to do so. In order to obtain that permit, the City must comply with the rules and regulations set by the state. These rules and regulations have been increasing over recent years. In March of this year, the state renewed and made changes to the regulations. City staff has been working on what is called the Storm Water Management Plan (SWMP), which outlines Nibley's plans and standard operating procedures to meet the requirements of the new permit. This will include some changes that will need to be made to our storm water ordinance, which staff will be bringing to the Council in the future. One of the Minimum Control Measures (MCM's) the City is required to be compliant with is "Good House Keeping" of the City's public works yard. This is not a new requirement, but one where the City has been lacking for some time. The goal is to contain contaminant from the public works yard, and not allow any of them to enter the storm water system, or pollute the ground water. To better facilitate that, the City has proposed a construction plan with a few key elements: Pave the interior or the yard with asphalt Pipe storm water to a retention facility at the rear of the property and provide some protections and other best management practices (BMP's) to improve the storm water quality Construct a concrete pad for washing of vehicles and equipment, that will drain to the sewer system instead of the storm water system. Construct a contained area to dump street sweeping and vac trailer materials that will drain to the sewer. Items will be dumped in this area, allowed to dry, and then taken to the landfill.	
	The project has been publicly bid per the Nibley City procurement policy. A pre-bid meeting was held last week in which four contractors	

	attended. The engineers estimate for the project was: \$200,000.00. Four bids were received and opened in a public bid opening on May 18. City Staff reviewed the following bids:		
	\$129,479.39 DWA Construction \$151,220.90 Consolidated Paving \$156,992.50 LeGrand Johnson \$199,763.00 Staker Parson		
	Staff found the bid form DWA Construction to be the lowest responsive bid. Staff is also familiar with the work of DWA Construction and is confident in the work the company would provide.		
Recommendation	Authorize the Public Works Department to purchase services from the low bidder to construct the project.		
Financial Impact	\$250,000 was budgeted in the FY 15/16 budget from multiple divisions in the Public Works Department to complete this project. The cost for the project will be shared by the Water Division, Sewer Division, Stormwater Division and the General Fund, which includes the Streets and Parks Divisions.

ORDINANCE 16-03

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING AN UPDATED GENERAL PLAN FOR NIBLEY CITY

WHEREAS, Utah Code Annotated §10-9a-401 requires that all municipalities located within the State of Utah adopt a General Plan; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the Nibley City General Plan is to plan for current and future needs of the municipality in regards to growth and development; and

WHEREAS, from time to time, it is necessary for cities to amend their general plan to reflect changes that have occurred within the city and to reflect the current values and vision of that city; and

WHEREAS, Nibley City has undertaken to revise its general plan to reflect such changes and growth that have occurred; and

WHEREAS, the attached document reflects the vision of Nibley City and will serve as a guide for growth and development for the near future.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE NIBLEY CITY COUNCIL LOCATED AT NIBLEY, UTAH, THAT:

The attached document, entitled "Nibley City General Plan" is adopted and

- 1. All ordinances, resolutions and policies of the City, or parts thereof, inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed, but only to the extent of such inconsistency. This repealer shall not be construed as reviving any law, order, resolution or ordinance or part thereof.
- 2. Should any provision, clause or paragraph of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, in whole or in part, such invalidity shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this ordinance or the Nibley City Municipal Code to which these amendments apply, The valid part of any provision, clause or paragraph of this ordinance shall be given independence from the invalid provisions or applications and to this end the parts, sections and subsections of this ordinance, together with the regulations contained therein, are hereby declared to be severable.

3. This ordinance shall become effective up	on posting as required by law.

ORDINANCE 16-04

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE COMPENSATION OF ELECTED AND STATUTORY OFFICERS OF NIBLEY CITY

WHEREAS, elected and statutory officers are required to devote a significant amount of time and talent to the effective administration of Nibley City; and

WHEREAS, elected and statutory officers should be fairly compensated for their time and expenses; and

WHEREAS, the Nibley City Council established a policy in 2015 of annually adjusting City Council Member compensation commensurate with the cost of living adjustment provided to other City employees.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE NIBLEY CITY COUNCIL OF NIBLEY, UTAH THAT:

- 1. All previous salary or compensation ordinances regarding the elected and statutory officers below are hereby repealed.
- 2. The compensation of the elected and statutory officers shall be as follows:
